Paramount High School FHA Members Win Gold in Chicago!

Bonnie Casillas and Jose Ramirez, Paramount High School students, won a national competition and received gold medals at the annual Future Homemakers of America (FHA) conference in Chicago, Illinois on July 8, 2010. After winning competitions at regional and statewide FHA meetings, Bonnie and Jose were invited to compete at the national conference in Chicago, Illinois. These students' victory came in the community service project category for Paramount FHA club members' volunteer work at the Paramount Convalescent Hospital. At least once a week, the Paramount High FHA students visited the Convalescent Hospital. The students would visit, talk, and share stories with the residents, and on occasions, the students would bring freshly baked cookies to their new friends. The students and seniors would look forward to decorating the halls and dining commons for the holidays. Bonnie and Jose

presented the "Chapter Service Manual" which highlights the FHA club's community service project with the Paramount Convalescent Hospital. This manual documents the hard work of the FHA students and their efforts to help our older citizens. The FHA club has been helping our community since 1984, and since the club's inception, Ms. Tanimoto and Ms. Lash have led this important campus club. Jose reports that Ms. Lash and Ms. Tanimoto donated a lot of time outside of normal school hours to prepare the team. With the guidance of Ms. Tanimoto, the students worked on their project to ensure that their manual and presentations met each of the requirements outlined in the rubric for the national competition. Ms. Tanimoto said, "I am so proud of these students and I was not surprised that Jose and Bonnie won the gold!" She further explains how the Paramount High School FHA worked hard last school year

at the national conference, where they competed in one of 25 categories. Paramount student's Bonnie Casillas and Jose Ramirez won the only gold medal for California.

Ms. Settles, counselor of Zamboni Middle School, took the lead as academic coach for the girls and developed a pacing guide and study calendar to get the girls ready for the championship. It was obvious to everyone on campus that these girls were serious and determined to win it all. It was not uncommon to walk into the office and see the girls with books scattered all over the conference room and thinking maps posted on all the walls. Teachers randomly popped into "study headquarters" to quiz the girls and help them decipher the complex college material. The entire staff got involved on a District day when the teachers reviewed a chapter from one of the college textbooks and placed the girls on stage as they each shouted out questions and reviewed their answers. It is an

understatement to say that the entire staff of Zamboni played an intricate part in developing these young scholars.

On June 15, 2010, well prepared and with a few butterflies in their stomachs, three scholars of Paramount Unified School District boarded the flight for Florida. Over the next couple of days they would make history. In round one of the competition they battled ferociously with the team from Madison and won by the skin of their teeth for a final score of 14 to 13. After reflecting with their coach during a break,

the team returned to round two with a vengeance. They defeated Nebraska with ease and confidence. On the evening of June 18, 2010, the young ladies from Frank J. Zamboni Middle School, stepped in the ballroom at the Westin Diplomat in Hollywood, Florida to compete for the title and honor of National Champions. A Piece of Cake



On Thursday July 1, 2010, Ms. Otani, a Language Arts teacher at Buena Vista High School, graciously consented to a baking demonstration for the 4th – 8th grade students at the Extended School Year (ESY) Program at Paramount Park School. The ESY Program is a summer program for Special Education students who attend Paramount Unified School District Middle Schools.

Ms. Otani is known for baking aesthetically beautiful and great tasting cakes and cupcakes. While sharing her knowledge of baking, Ms. Otani also integrated some important object lessons associated with baking. Additionally, she used the baking arena to show how friendly math and reading can be as well as the importance of following directions.

Ms. Gwen Yates, the principal for Paramount Park School ESY Program, prepared the students for the presentation by leading a discussion on related baking to the real world. She asked students to describe how each ingredient in a recipe tastes by itself. She asked, "Would you eat a stick of butter, or drink a cup of baking powder?" The students responded, "No!" Ms. Yates went on to discuss how each ingredient may taste horrible by itself, but, when mixed together properly, they come together to make a delicious treat. Though all ingredients are different from one another and may taste bad alone, they are each necessary parts to create the whole. "This is also true of school", says Ms. Yates. "There may be parts of school that students do not favor such as reading comprehension practice, fluency practice, or basic math facts; however, each part is necessary in order to score proficiently on assessments and assignments."

After the anticipatory set, students were led to the kitchen where Ms. Otani had set up her bakery. There were boxes of cake mix, various vibrantly colored icings in prepared pastry bags, sprinkle toppings, cupcakes tins, as well as printed directions so each student could follow along as she made the cupcakes.

The students quietly watched and listened while Ms. Otani walked them through the demonstration step-by-step. Students were encouraged to read directions thoroughly when baking and make sure they could clarify anything that they didn't understand. She ensured that they understood that not following directions could ruin the product. This point was related to taking summative assessments. If students don't follow directions carefully while testing, the final product, their scores, will be compromised.

Thanks to Ms. Otani, baking is a "piece of cake"



WIRTZ WIZARDS ARTISTS EXTRAORDINAIRE

Wirtz School's 5th grade students had an exciting year. Besides all the wonderful lessons their teachers developed and taught, one teacher decided to go one step further. Noting that the Art Curriculum was often pushed aside in favor of the academics, Mr. Erik Caruso decided to bring art education to the students. He knew that, although time was limited in the classroom, the students had plenty of time at home. They received lessons and participated in discussions at school, then took the project home and worked on it by themselves and with their families.

Contacting five different artists, Mr. Caruso invited them to share their art work and teach their particular styles to the students. The artists included Mr. Thomas Campbell, Mr. Shepard Fairey, Mr. Taka Hayashi, Mr. Mike Kershner, and Mr. Albert Reyes.

Mr. Hayashi, with backing of Vans® shoes, provided a lesson on Shoe Design. Students were given blank shoe sketches and encouraged to design their 'coolest' shoe.

Mr. Reyes shared black and white graphics and students worked in stark contrasting colors. Mr. Reyes actually silk screened 5th grade student, Jesus Lopez's winning design onto t-shirts for the three winners of his style for the 5th grade teachers.

Mr. Campbell's art lesson was a creative floral piece. Each child was supplied with seven petals and a circle center. Designs were colored on the flower and petals were first glued. Yarn was 'stitched' to create a 3-D effect. "Mr. Caruso and his wife had to draw and cut every petal and center," said Stacey Porter, a 5th grade student in Mr. Caruso's class, "He really worked hard on his own time to make sure the entire 5th grade had a chance to make our own flowers."

Mr. Kershner demonstrated artwork that used a silhouette of an animal that was then filled with repetitive patterns. Each child was encouraged to hide a phrase or word in their work. "I drew a panda," said Giselle Rodriguez, a student in Mr. Caruso's 5th grade class, "I put in the message 'save the earth'. It was a lot of fun and serious at the same time."

Finally, Mr. Fairey shared his 'Night of the Dead' artwork. "We used black construction paper and yellow yarn or glitter to create our design," said Karla Figueroa, another one of Mr. Caruso's 5th students, "We showed a tradition our family celebrated. It was great!"

The art lessons were spread throughout the school year and the students had plenty of time to design and create their piece. At the end of every project lesson, five pieces were selected from each of the 5th grade classroom by the students and teachers. This created a pool of twenty-five pieces for every style taught. Each artist then chose the top three pieces of art done in his style with the winners being announced at the Wirtz Art Show on Thursday, June 3, 2010. The artists decided to give the top three winners prizes that ranged from skateboards to original artwork to a chance to design personal Vans® shoes.
